Member Agencies Progress Reports

Jurisdiction's Annual Fall Review 2020: CalRecycle Local Assistance and Market Development, Roberta Goldenpenny and Jill Larner have expressed a tentative date, in November 2022, to visit the Imperial Valley for the annual progress review of the following implementation for the local programs; AB 341 Mandatory Commercial Recycling (MCR), SB 1826 Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling (MORe) and AB1383 Short-Lived Climate Pollutants (SLCP): Organic Waste Methane Emissions Reductions and determine if the jurisdiction has met the requirements of AB 939 (known as the Integrated Waste Management Act [IWMA]). IVRMA is available to meet with each city representative to prepare for the review. Jurisdictions will be expected to meet the requirements requested on the 2021 Fall Annual Review and MCR & MORe Plan currently being worked on by each member agency.

Electronic Annual Review (EAR2021): IVRMA has submitted the 2021 Electronic Annual Review in the representation of all (8) jurisdictions. The annual report describes the progress a jurisdiction has made in achieving the Integrated Waste Management Act requirements, (AB 939, Chapter 1095, Statutes of 1989). The EAR collects information on the jurisdiction's SRRE and HHWE diversion programs, recycling programs at large venues and events, and SB1826 Mandatory Commercial Organics Recycling progress and AB1383 Short-Lived Climate Pollutants (SLCP): Organic Waste Methane Emissions Reductions. A complete Electronic Annual Report (EAR) for the year 2021 is attached for your review. (See attached report on pgs 10 -86)

Annual Form 303 Household Hazardous Waste Collection Report: Imperial Valley Resource Management Agency has begun the collection of data required to submit and complete Form 303. The information reported is the collected amounts of Household Hazardous Waste (HHW), including Universal Waste (UW) and other related waste collected from July 1 through June 30 throughout the (3) three HHW Facilities located in Brawley, El Centro, and Calexico. The reporting form is due November 01, 2022.

<u>Capacity Planning Requirements:</u> Capacity planning reports were due to CalRecycle on August 1, 2022. Jurisdictions are responsible for submitting the implementation schedule for collecting organic waste recycling capacity information from jurisdictions.



CalRecycle Grant Undates

City/County Payment Program: CalRecycle has announced the City/County Payment Program for the Fiscal Year 2022-23 due January 17, 2023. SB 1013, Beverage container recycling. This bill expands the California Beverage Container Recycling and Litter Reduction Act to include wine bottles and distilled spirit containers. This program aims to reach and maintain an 80% recycling rate for the California Refund Value of beverage containers from aluminum, glass, plastic, and bi-metal. The grant's eligible activities are water refill station installation and maintenance, advertising/promotion, education and outreach at community events, on-site school presentations, and litter clean-up events focusing on the AB341 Mandatory Commercial Recycling mandate. Funding is based per capita basis. The minimum amount eligible is \$5,000.00. This grant has been submitted by IVRMA since 2009 in the representation of all member agencies. IVRMA will submit a request for funding on the due date noted. (See pages 86-102)

Beverage Container Redemption Pilot Project Grant: CalRecycle also has an ongoing Beverage Container Redemption Pilot Project Grant which allows opportunities for the California local government and recycling center operators to improve redemption opportunities for eligible beverage containers and increase recycling rates in unserved convenience zones statewide. The projects supported by these funds are numerous possibilities and flexible for methods of redemption including stationary drop-off locations with a locked and secure drop-off bin that pays consumers, mobile pilot projects, that allows pick up at your own home, and rotating mobile recycling centers that can move from city to city. SB1383 Local Assistant Grant Program: The Local Assistant Grant FY 2020-21 (Cycle 1) is due on November 03, 2022. This grant was applied for by a member agency. IVRMA will not be submitting an expenditure report on behalf of the member agencies.

Waste Tire Amnesty Grant (TA): The Final Payment Request for the Waste Tire Amnesty Grant was submitted on September 2022 for the total amount of \$64,000. During the cycle of this grant, we collected over 8,000 tires throughout the member agency clean-up events.

Local Government Waste Tire Clean-Up Grants: The Final Payment Request for the Local Government Waste Tire Cleanup Grant, TCU18, was submitted for \$214,473.69. During the cycle of this grant, IVRMA collected over 20,900 illegally dumped tires throughout all (8) jurisdictions in the course of two years. This grant is now closed. IVRMA has received the Notice to Proceed (NTP) for TCU19 as effective as of October 14, 2022. The amount granted is not to exceed a total of \$250,000.00 for the collection of 40,000 illegally dumped tires. The grant provides funding for the collection of illegally dumped tires and their activities for the term of two years from the date noted on the NTP through September 2024. IVRMA Tire Crew will commence the collection of tire pick-up requests for illegally dumped tires. We appreciate you contacting IVRMA for your requests and your patience.



Jurisdiction Compliance Progress

<u>Procurement:</u> Jurisdictions are recommended to encourage the local government or businesses to establish a written procurement policy. The Buy Recycled program promotes the State's policy to "buy green." IVRMA has provided outreach and education on buying recycled products to 3 schools, 4 community events, and one litter clean-up event during 2022. The presentation provides residents and students with information on examples of recycled products sold in local markets, household items that can be reused, and information on the natural resources reduced when using recycled products. The objective of this presentation is focused on informing the communities of the importance of managing resources, reducing trash, reusing, and recycling. 
Edible Food Recovery: IVRMA has been working in collaboration with the Imperial County Public Health Department during tier 1 food inspections. In the months of September and October, IVRMA provided outreach and education to local supermarkets and met with the main point of contact in charge of sending out donations. During these on-site visits, we encounter locations unaware of the requirements under SB1383 Edible Food Requirement mandates. Sites visited in the City of Brawley, El Centro, Holtville, and Calexico were confirmed to have an organic bin in place. However, when evaluating the organic bin some appeared to be contaminated. IVRMA will be working with local markets under Tier 1 to assist them with the process of donating edible food to the local Edible Food Recovery Organizations (EFRO) and the monitoring of contamination. In efforts to decrease contamination IVRMA has been requested to assist at the store's monthly staff meetings to provide a presentation on compost to employees.

Collection System: SB 1383 requires that clean streams of organic material be collected, recovered, and recycled into new end-products like compost or biofuel. The information requested on the Electronic Annual Report (EAR) under the SLCP Collection Container System for residents was based on the information provided by jurisdictions for the year 2021. The data collected indicates that a total of over 30,0000 residents throughout the Imperial Valley receive the 3+ collection system. The residential is provided with 3- 96 gal carts, black for trash, blue for recycling, and green for yard/food. The commercial has 2 metal bins, 1 for trash, 1 for recycling, and a 68-gal green cart for organic. Only 463 accounts for the City of El Centro were reported to have been exempted from organic services due to the non-generation of material. The County of Imperial is currently evaluating the total number of subject properties. At this time there is no franchise hauler agreement reported for the County of Imperial. The graph below reflects the percentage reported under the 3+Collection System for the EAR 2021.

Commercial & Residential Programs: The Commercial & Residential Programs in the Imperial Valley reflect the material types collected and diverted by residents, commercial properties, and large venues/events. Any concrete, asphalt, mulch, trimmings, household hazardous waste collection facilities, and compositing programs is data that can be reported on the EAR. Other materials that can be reported are on-site composting/mulching, materials exchanged at thrift shops, such as furniture, clothing, scrap, bulky items or white goods, household items, and any materials that are diverted from the landfill. Activities at large venues and events can generate a significant amount of waste in a short period. Jurisdictions are encouraged to follow through with their franchised hauler to submit the data sheet and ensure the containers facilitate the proper recycling for residents attending events. A sample of the letter and Diversion Recycling Data Sheet are attached. (See attached samples on pgs. 103-108). Please note that the information on the Venue/Event Waste Diversion/Recycling Data Sheet is required upon adding an event on the EAR.




Education & Outreach: IVRMA would like to propose a volunteer outreach program that will assist member agencies with education and compliance. The program would benefit all jurisdictions to increase awareness of the recycling mandates and build the regional education campaign. This will be at no additional cost to member agencies. Volunteers would provide support to our staff at community events, litter clean-up events, school presentations, and city clean-up events. During the years 2021 and 2022, IVRMA has participated in over 53 events throughout all jurisdictions. For the year 2022, we have thus far provided education at 19 city clean-up events in collaboration with the franchised haulers, 4 elementary school presentations, 1 litter clean-up event with the support of the City of Calexico, and over 38 community events and the year is not over yet! In recent months we have received an increase in demand to participate in local events by public agencies. IVRMA currently has 1 Outreach and Education Coordinator. Integrating an environmental volunteer program would provide support to be able to participate in all events requested. I would like to recognize Clarissa Delgadillo, our Education and Outreach Recycling Coordinator for doing such an awesome job in coordinator and promoting the education and awareness of the 6 "R's" "REFUSE, REDUCE, REUSE, ROT, RECYCLE, and REPAIR under the CalRecycle mandate

requirements through all these events and social media.

MWELO, CALGreen, C&D: MWELO-All agencies in California must adopt, implement, and enforce the Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance (MWELO) or an ordinance that is at least as effective in conserving water. The MWELO requires efficient landscape design, including the use of compost and mulch, to conserve water. AB 2515 requires the California Department of Water Resources (DWR), by January 1, 2020, and at least every three years thereafter, to update the MWELO or make a finding that an update at that time is not useful. During the submission of the EAR for 2021, it was discovered that only the City of El Centro has submitted an MWELO report or an ordinance under the requirements for the California Department of Water Resources (DWR). IVRMA would like to request an update on the status of each jurisdiction for reporting purposes for the EAR 2022. The EAR data requires information such as the number of projects subject to the Model Water Efficient Landscape Ordinance (MWELO). CALGreen -CALGreen requires covered projects to recycle and/or salvage for reuse a minimum of 65% of the nonhazardous construction and demolition waste or meet local construction and demolition waste management ordinance, whichever is more stringent. IVRMA did not receive any data on construction and demolition debris removal activities conducted in compliance with CALGreen. C&D -C&D diversion ordinances include a requirement that a waste management plan (WMP) be completed and submitted before the beginning of a project. IVRMA received minimal data on the diversion of C&D materials such as asphalt paving, brick, concrete/cement, gypsum board or drywall, rock, soil, fines, mixed C&D, and any data on the materials mentioned. It is encouraged for jurisdictions to provide IVRMA with any C&D-related tonnage for the reporting purposes of the EAR calendar year 2022.

Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Programs: The Household Hazardous Waste Facilities provide Free drop-off for residents in the Imperial Valley to properly dispose of Sharps, E-Waste, Oil, and HHW products that are flammable, corrosive, poisonous, toxic, and batteries, thermostats, and fluorescent lamps. During the calendar year 2021, the facilities in combination have collected over 197,400 lbs. of household hazardous waste materials. The chart below reflects a breakdown of the amounts collected per material type. IVRMA's three household hazardous waste facilities are certified used oil collection centers. Residents and Conditionally Exempt Small Quantity Generators (CESQGs) can dispose of and responsibly manage household hazardous waste products.



General Discussion Items/New Business:

IVRMA TAC Request to go dark: IVRMA is requesting to go dark during the month of November and hold the next meeting on January 26, 2022.

<u>Water Fountain Refill Stations</u>: The City/County Payment Program provides funding for water bottle refill stations/water fountains encouraging the Zero Waste goal and reduction of plastic water bottles used by providing the ability to refill reusable water bottles. IVRAM would like to open an assessment and recommendations on the best practice to move forward using the funding provided by these programs. The total combined funding of this cycle's grant is a little over \$50,000 which includes the cost of advertisement, education, and outreach for school presentations, litter clean-up events, community events, and recycling waste baskets for all 8 jurisdictions.

IVRMA Trailer Inventory: IVRMA currently stores 7 trailers parked in the City of El Centro. Below is a list of the year, make, and model of the trailers. IVRMA would like to request the transfer/donate the trailers to the cities for better use. The trailers will require minimal repairs and are available to look at upon request. Attached is the Application for the Replacement or Transfer of the Title needed according to the DMV process. The Imperial County Public Health Department, Yoli Viviana Sanchez, Health Program Coordinator would like to work in correlation with IVRMA'a Outreach & Education Department in efforts to bring awareness per the requirements of the CalFresh program and SB1383 Edible Food Recovery requirements. Ms. Sanchez has provided a list of Edible Food Recovery Organizations and is available to speak to the committee on how this teamwork will benefit the jurisdiction's compliance efforts. In 2004 Governor Schwarzenegger signed Chapter 879, Statutes of 2004 (Montañez, Assembly Bill [AB] 2176) into law. AB 2176 is intended to increase opportunities for recycling and divert from landfills the waste materials generated by the largest events and venues in California.

A large event is defined as:

• An event that charges an admission price (or is operated by a local agency) and serves an average of more than 2,000 individuals (including employees and volunteers) per day of operation of the event. Events include, but are not limited to, a public, nonprofit, or private park, parking lot, golf course, street system, or other open space when being used for a public event, including, but not limited to, a sporting event or a flea market.

A large venue is defined as:

• A permanent venue facility that annually seats or serves an average of more than 2,000 individuals (including employees and volunteers) within the grounds of the facility per day of operation of the venue facility. A venue facility includes, but is not limited to, a public, nonprofit, or privately owned or operated stadium, amphitheater, arena, hall, amusement park, conference or civic center, zoo, aquarium, airport, racetrack, horse track, performing arts center, fairground, museum, theater, or other public attraction facility. A site under common ownership or control that includes more than one large venue that is contiguous with other large venues in the site is a single large venue.

(Name of Event or Facility) qualifies as a large (event/venue) as defined above. As such, the following State mandates apply:

- A representative of (*Name of Event or Facility*) must meet with recycling and solid waste service providers to develop a solid waste reduction plan and program implementation timeline. The plan should address all types of waste materials generated (paper, cardboard, beverage containers, food, etc.), and consider programs to reduce the volume or weight of each type of waste material generated. The plan must be updated every two years.
- The (*Jurisdiction's Name*) is mandated to annually submit to CalRecycle specified information regarding waste diversion programs at venues and events generating the greatest quantities of waste. (*Name of Event or Facility*) falls into this category. Therefore, you will need to submit the following information to the (*City/County*):
 - (1) For the year (20__), types and weight of waste disposed of in a landfill and types and weight of waste materials diverted from a landfill through recycling or other efforts.
 - (2) Written documentation of the waste reduction, reuse, and recycling programs being implemented in the year (20__).

(3) A brief explanation for delay, if any waste diversion program was not implemented as planned.

Fair: If the fairground venue does not have sufficient attendance per day of operation to be considered large, but the fair itself does meet the definition, check the Fair box and report only on the activities of the fair and not all events held at the fairground.

Fairground: If the fairground venue does have sufficient attendance per day of operation to be considered large, check the **Fairground** box and collectively report on all the events held at the fairground.

Music festival/concert (event): Includes festivals/concerts that are considered large and that are conducted at a non-venue location, such as a park, beach, street, school, etc., or that are conducted at a venue (such as a stadium) that does not have sufficient attendance per day of operation to be considered a large venue.

Participatory sport venue: Includes golf courses, ski resorts, pools, etc.

Sporting event: Includes marathons, auto, motorcycle or bicycle races; soccer or volleyball tournaments, etc. that are considered large and that are conducted at a non-venue location, such as a park, beach, street, etc., or that are conducted at a venue (such as those listed on this page) that does not have sufficient attendance per day of operation to be considered a large venue.

Theater/amphitheatre/auditorium (venue): Includes live theater and movie theaters.

Other: Venues and events that do not fit any of the categories on the report form.

If you are receiving this letter as the operator of event that is one of several events hosted by a permanent venue facility, it means that the venue facility does not have sufficient average attendance per day of operation to necessitate collectively reporting on all events hosted at the facility. However, your event has been identified as a large event that must report.

In addition, you may find the following definitions useful:

Disposed Tons: The weight, in tons, of all waste created which is disposed at <u>permitted landfills</u>, at <u>transformation facilities</u>, or is exported from the State.

Diverted Tons: The weight, in tons, of all materials that through any combination of waste prevention (source reduction), recycling, reuse and composting activities that would have otherwise been disposed at permitted landfills and transformation facilities.



Cal Recycle Community Composting in Green Spaces Grant (CCGS)

The purpose of this competitive grant program is to increase the number of community groups operating small-scale composting programs in green spaces within disadvantaged and low-income communities, and to increase the capacity of those composting programs.



Thermophilic "HOT" Composting

- Super-active microbes generate heat in proper conditions
- All materials must be available at the same time, chopped (½" 1½") & mixed
- Minimum volume: 3'x 3'x 3'

(1 cubic yd. = 27 cubic ft.)
•Requires frequent turning

• Finished compost in one to three months
